

I wanted to send out a big THANK YOU to Vickie Chauvin for a very successful Superbowl donation pool. The winners were as follows:





U.S. expects record oil production in 2019 & 2020 may be good sign for Louisiana oil sector

The United States expects domestic oil production to reach new heights this year and next, and that prices for both crude and gasoline will be lower than they were in 2018.

Government forecasters also are sticking to their forecast that the United States. Already the world's biggest oil producer will become a net exporter of crude and petroleum products in 2020. Most of the increase is expected to come from the Permian Basin in Texas and New Mexico, where production has been booming for several years as operators use hydraulic fracturing and other techniques to squeeze more oil and gas from shale formations.

The rising production in the Permian basin likely will continue to benefit Louisiana's downstream sector, as petrochemical companies and refiners continue to source plentiful oil and natural gas from neighboring Texas, said David Dismukes, head of the LSU Center for Energy Studies. The flip side is that the attraction to cheaper, abundant drilling in the Permian Basin has detracted from onshore production in Louisiana in recent years. A rebound in prices from the deep slump that started in 2014 is generating a little more interest in the state's natural gas supplies in northwest Louisiana and potentially developing oil across the Louisiana 'disproportionately exposed' to Venezuelan oil targeted in U.S. sanctions midsection of the state where shale formations are harder to drill than in Texas.

The shale boom has helped fuel billions of dollars in investment in Louisiana's petrochemical sector, where companies are building large manufacturing complexes along the Mississippi River and near Lake Charles.

"People kind of forget about it now, but 4, 5, 6 years ago, people were questioning whether these were prudent investments," Dismukes said. "As we've moved into this kind of revolution, that underscores this really was a good investment decision for the industry as a whole."

Dismukes added the fact that the U.S. is becoming a net exporter of oil is a good sign for Louisiana's oil sector, which is an exporter of petroleum, especially refined products. Plus, the state's liquefied natural gas exporters will benefit, as they continue moving forward with multibillion-dollar LNG export facilities, especially in the Lake Charles region.

LSU researchers last fall cut their forecast for job growth in the oil and natural gas-producing sector in Louisiana, mainly because of geopolitical tensions and price uncertainties. Still, the LSU forecast was a "mixed bag" for Louisiana oil and gas, and projected job growth in both the production and downstream industrial sectors.

The price drop outlined in the U.S. Energy Information Administration report likely won't spell doom for deepwater oil drillers, said Eric Smith, head of the Tulane Energy Institute. Oil companies generally make investment decisions based on longer time horizons than the EIA's short-term outlook.

"They're worried about what prices are going to be in 2021, 2022," he said, adding "\$54 isn't going to kill them." However, offshore oil producers have shifted to more efficient drilling projects that don't require as much capital investment, he said. Dismukes noted the increased efficiencies mean not as many workers will be employed by offshore drillers.

U.S. expects record oil production in 2019 & 2020 may be good sign for Louisiana oil sector

The EIA said Tuesday that it expects the United States to pump 12.4 million barrels of crude a day in 2019 and 13.2 million barrels a day in 2020. The January average was 12 million barrels a day, up 90,000 from December.

"The U.S. energy industry continues to transform itself," said Linda Capuano, administrator of the agency, which is part of the Energy Department. The agency expects U.S. benchmark crude to average \$54.79 a barrel this year and \$58 next year, down from \$65 in 2018. It expects internationally traded oil to average \$61 a barrel this year and \$62 next year, down from \$71 in 2018.

The 2020 price forecast is \$3 a barrel lower than the agency had previously predicted. Capuano said strong growth in oil production worldwide would push prices lower. That should produce nationwide average gasoline prices of \$2.47 a gallon this year and \$2.56 next year, down from \$2.73 in 2018, according to the agency's shortterm energy outlook.

Oil prices tumbled in the last three months of 2018 on forecasts that global economic growth will weaken and hurt demand at the same time that production is surging in the U.S. Concern about oversupply led OPEC and its allies, including Russia, to agree in December to limit output during the first half of 2019. On Tuesday, OPEC reported that its member nations sharply reduced production in January.

With rising production in the Permian Basin, the Energy Information Administration estimates that U.S. net imports of crude and petroleum products fell from 3.8 million barrels a day in 2017 to 2.4 million barrels a day in 2018.

The agency forecast that net imports will decline to about 900,000 barrels a day this year, then turn into a net export of about

The total U.S. rig count adds 2 to 1,051 after gaining 4 a week ago, according to Baker Hughes' <u>latest</u> weekly survey. The count of active U.S. oil drilling rigs rose 3 to 857 following last week's gain of 7, while gas rigs lost 1 to 194. WTI crude maintains earlier gains, now +2% to \$55.49/bbl.

Mardi Gras King Cake



Nutrition Facts

1 slice: 227 calories, 4g fat (1g saturated fat), 10mg cholesterol, 123mg sodium, 44g carbohydrate (23g sugars, 1g fiber), 3g protein.

Ingredients

- 1 package (1/4 ounce) active dry yeast
- 1/2 cup warm water (110° to 115°)
- 1/2 cup warm milk (110° to 115°)
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 large egg
- 4 to 4-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cans (12-1/2 ounces each) almond cake and pastry filling

GLAZE:

3 cups confectioners' sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract, 3 to 4 tablespoons water, and purple, green and colored sugar

Directions

- In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add the milk, shortening, sugar, salt, egg and 2 cups flour. Beat on medium speed for 3 minutes. Beat until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough (dough will be sticky).
- Turn onto a floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, about 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour.
- Punch dough down. Turn onto a lightly floured surface; divide in half. Roll one portion into a 16-in. x 10-in. rectangle. Spread almond filling to within 1/2 in. of edges. Roll up jelly-roll style, starting with a long side; pinch seam to seal. Place seam side down on a greased baking sheet; pinch ends together to form a ring. Repeat with remaining dough and filling. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 1 hour.
- Bake at 375° for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on a wire rack. For glaze, combine the confectioners' sugar, vanilla and enough water to achieve desired consistency. Spread over cooled cakes. Sprinkle with colored sugars.
