


I hope the month of May finds you all well. I'm happy the winter temperatures are gone here in the South and the April showers have washed away the pollen that causes so many of us allergy symptoms. Looking out my windows now, it is a beautiful sunny day, temperature in the 70s, and all the trees full of beautiful green leaves. I hope everyone can enjoy some time outdoors, safely, as we all need to continue social distancing until this crisis is over.

The Board wants to reiterate that the health, safety, and well being of our members is ultimately the most important thing to consider these days. While there is a great risk in having monthly meetings, we urge clubs to NOT have physical meetings while your areas still have active cases and increased risks of infection. For 2020, meeting requirements will NOT be enforced. With the success we are seeing with meetings conducted through web applications like Zoom, Webex, and others; we know that clubs have some resources for having meetings and educational programs during this time. If you have someone in your club with the technical savvy to help make that happen, your club can keep members engaged during the pandemic. Just know that while this is a great option, clubs are under no obligation to meet right now.

Two regions have officially conducted region business as of the time of this

letter. The West Region has elected Heather Woods from the Farmington Club as the 2021 Region Director. The Southeast Region has elected Margie Steed from the Red River Club as the 2021 Region Director. Congratulations to Heather and Margie! Thank you for stepping up to share your knowledge and help lead your regions next year! We all hope and pray that life will be back to normal in 2021 and we will be able to resume our physical region meetings.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the plunging oil prices have hit our membership hard. Businesses have cut spending, laid off employees, and even shuttered their operations. As of the end of April, we have less than 900 members with all active clubs having sent membership renewals. That equates to another 16% decrease

in membership. With the uncertainty of the industry and our impacted members getting back to work, the Board has reviewed the financial obligations of our contract with the Sheraton Pittsburgh with the Finance Review Committee. We feel the likelihood of having the necessary attendance at Convention in September to meet the financial obligations of the contract are questionable. The chance of losing tens of thousands of dollars this year are more than we can afford to risk. The Force Majeure Clause in our contract could possibly free us from the contract if we cancel completely, but we would likely incur legal costs

getting out of it. The Sheraton will allow us to move our contract to 2022, without any financial cost incurred. We will have to renegotiate room costs and projected number of room nights used based on changes made to the convention format that take place in 2021. With that change, the meeting of the Board of Directors at Convention takes place on Thursday, instead of Tuesday. This brings the Board in on Wednesday instead of Monday, reducing the number of nights necessary for each board members by two, lowering the ADDC cost of the Board at Convention. It also reduces the number of room nights used for the Convention, which affects the contracted Convention room rate, therefore, we will have to renegotiate the total number of rooms needed and the anticipated food and beverage costs, which could change the final room rates. That information will be shared at a future time.

The move of the 2022 Convention to Pittsburgh will mean moving last year's approved 2022 Convention site of Albuquerque, NM to 2023. Any plans currently in the works for 2023 will need to be pushed to 2024. This was not an easy decision, but necessary to ensure the Association does not suffer the devastating blow of the possible financial loss of an unsuccessful Convention this year.

Not having our annual Convention and Educational Conference is unprecedented, as is almost everything we see happening around us in 2020. Over the next several months, we will be working on the details for handling necessary business of the Association for 2020, such as any urgent Bylaw changes, election of officers, etc. by mail-in or electronic means. We believe the normal Convention Board Meeting this year can be handled by electronic means, so there will be no more physical board meetings in 2020. Please bear with us as we navigate through these uncertain times.

Until next month, please continue to take care of yourself. Don't put yourself in any unnecessary risk.







Oil and gas industry sees wish list bills move through Louisiana Legislature

Louisiana's oil and gas companies saw several items on their legislative wish list move forward this week, as a bill addressing severance taxes cleared a significant hurdle Friday.

The Louisiana Oil and Gas Association has outlined several bills and resolutions they support in the 2020 Legislative Session, many of which the group says would give the state's oil producers much-needed aid as the industry faces a historic oil crisis.

Many of the items LOGA is targeting have been on the group's radar for years, but LOGA President Gifford Briggs has said the measures are needed now to keep the industry afloat.

Reduce Louisiana's severance tax on oil and gas

House Bill 506 status: Passed by the House, 72-24

House Concurrent Resolution 65 status: Awaiting passage in the House

House Bill 506, by Republican Rep. Phillip DeVillier of Eunice, would scale down the severance tax on oil and gas from 12.5% to 8.5% over the next eight years. The severance tax is a state tax paid on all natural resources produced in the state, but the bulk of the collected revenue comes from oil.

The bill was passed by the House on Friday, and will move to the Senate side.

The bill originally had a provision that would drop the tax to 2% if oil prices fell below \$30 per barrel, but it was struck by an amendment in the House Appropriations Committee. It passed the committee Monday with a unanimous 19-0 vote.

Late last week, the bill passed the House Ways and Means Committee 14-3.

According to the fiscal note, the bill would cut about \$112.6 million in state revenue over the next five years.

The severance tax provides the state with a significant amount of revenue. The majority of the revenue goes to the state, and in fiscal year 2019, the tax brought in \$529 million, according to the Louisiana Department of Revenue.

Another measure, House Concurrent Resolution 65 by Lafayette Republican Rep. Stuart Bishop, would suspend the severance tax on oil and gas starting from the date it's adopted until 60 days after the end of the 2021 legislative session.

Gov. John Bel Edwards delayed collection of the payments in April, but he said the Legislature would have to act to fully suspend the tax.

Limiting coastal lawsuits filed by local governments

Senate Bill 359 status: Awaiting passage in the Senate

Senate Concurrent Resolution 7: Passed by the Senate and referred to House Committee on Natural Resources and Environment

Senate Bill 359, written by Republican Sen. Bob Hensgens of Abbeville, would make it so that only certain state officials, such as the attorney general, could file lawsuits related to states concerns regarding coastal use permits.

The bill was filed before the COVID-19 crisis, as streamlining the coastal lawsuits. The organization and other oil and gas advocates have criticized the lawsuits, saying they drive away oil producers and jobs. LOGA has pushed for the bill, saying it is needed during the crisis so companies can pay employees instead of paying attorneys.

LOGA says several groups, including the regional economic development coalition One Acadiana, support of the bill.

The bill had passed through the Senate's Committee on Natural Resources earlier this month, but the Senate sent it to the Finance Committee on Monday. At the time, a joint statement from Briggs and Tyler Gray, president of Louisiana Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, said they were hoping for a "swift hearing" from the committee, though they disagreed with the move.

"On more than one occasion, the Secretary or Department of Natural Resources has indicated he has all of the necessary resources to enforce the coastal program. Further, the Attorney General of Louisiana has indicated there is no anticipated fiscal impact to his department," the statement said. "Nonetheless, the legislative fiscal office is referencing public testimony without consideration for current law providing for contingency and fee shifting arrangements as reason for the move."

Senate Concurrent Resolution 7, by Slidell Republican Sen. Sharon Hewitt, is another measure championed by LOGA. The resolution urges local entities to drop the coastal lawsuits.

LOGA and LMOGA have expressed support for the measure and applauded the Senate for passing it this week.

"The lawsuits target over 200 companies—the majority of which are small and independent operators, who help provide over 33,000 direct high-paying jobs and \$3 billion in wages," Briggs said.


"We applaud Sen. Hewitt and all the members for their leadership and support of SCR 7," Gray said.

As 'contact tracing' moves forward in Louisiana, Republicans push to make sure it'

Republicans in the Louisiana Legislature who are skeptical of contact tracing in the coronavirus response spearheaded by Democratic Gov. John Bel Edwards are advancing legislation to ensure that residents have the right not to participate.

The legislators pushing the measures say their constituents are concerned about contact tracing, a long-standing practice of epidemiologists where state workers call people who have been infected with a contagious disease to trace who they may have come into contact with. The state then calls those people to inform them they may have been exposed — in this case to the novel coronavirus — and advise them how to protect themselves and others.

The efforts by Republican lawmakers come as the Democratic governor continues to hold up contact tracing as a crucial part of the state's reopening plan. At a news conference Friday, Edwards called the fears about contact tracing, such as privacy concerns, "unfounded," while also stressing that there will be no mandates on people to take part — or penalties if they refuse.

"This is one of those efforts that I would encourage people to not think along the lines of what you have a right to do or not to do, but what is the right thing to do," Edwards said.

Rep. Blake Miguez, chair of the House Republican delegation, tacked an amendment to the state's operating budget Thursday that prohibits money from being spent on any contact tracing program that is mandatory.

The House on Friday passed House Concurrent Resolution 93 by Rep. Raymond Crews, R-Bossier City, that directs the governor to require those conducting contact tracing to disclose to people it is voluntary and make sure no penalties are put in place for those who don't participate.

The governor said as of Friday, 450 people have been hired to do the work, above the initial goal of 250. The state has pegged the number of contact tracers it needs at about 700, but officials say they will scale up to that number if needed. The Edwards administration says it plans to pay around \$15 million to \$20 million in federal dollars to four companies to hire contact tracers.

Star-Spangled Parfaits



Ingredients

- 2 cups fresh strawberries, cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 4 teaspoons reduced-fat raspberry walnut vinaigrette
