


Happy New Year to all my Desk and Derrick family!

2020...are any of you as mesmerized by that number as I? Twenty years ago, the year 2000 was a huge milestone in our history in many ways...the end of the 1900s, the Y2K computer issues, having to learn to start writing the current year with "20" instead of "19" as we had all our lives. But today, 2020 is just a cool number to see and say, I guess. For ADDC, it hopes to be a year of continued recovery and regrowth, provided we all set our minds to and make a commitment to invest a little extra time into this organization that we all hold so dear.

Your 2020 ADDC Board will meet for the annual Budget and Planning Meeting, February 8, 2020. At this meeting, we will review ADDC Committee plans and funding requests, set membership and revenue goals for the year, approve a balanced budget, and strategize on ways to strengthen the Association. As we have in the past few years, we must focus on two critical areas of concern: **revenue** and **membership**.

Though our revenue and spending have been a main concern of the membership over the past couple of years, the biggest reason for our financial struggles have been the yearly loss of members. We had 1,487 members in 2017. We lost 291 members in 2018, ending 2018 with 1,196 members. Anticipating another loss, the 2019 Board budgeted for 1,080 members. We ended 2019 with around 1,123 members. That seems like a great number since we budgeted for 1,080 members. But considering that we gained over 100 new members, we actually lost nearly 200 members in 2019. Previous Boards attempted to tackle our shrinking membership numbers through marketing strategies that unfortunately did not solve the problem and ended up costing us a lot of money. We can't fault them for attempting to solve our shrinking membership. Finding a way to stop or significantly slow our shrinking membership numbers is the only way to save our Association. We need to find ways to regain the support of our industries and to attract members to ADDC. What can the Association and our clubs offer members that will keep them engaged and provide the educational experience that they and their employers expect for their financial investment? This needs to be an ongoing discussion throughout the Association. Please discuss at your membership meetings, board meetings, etc. Share any great ideas with your Region Director so they can be passed along to the ADDC Board. One thing that each of us can do for now is encourage our 2019 club members to renew!

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If we can just stop losing members and stabilize, we can buy time to turn things around. If we see another year of typical membership loss, we will drop below 1,000 members soon and that is a milestone we do not want to see! If each of us commits to recruit one new member, we could double our size and create a huge positive impact on ADDC. If only 25% of us succeed, we still can see a significant improvement and benefit with 300 new members. This IS NOT impossible.

The nearly 400 loss in members equates to a yearly revenue loss of \$22,000. But we were spending more than we were taking in, which ultimately led to yearly net losses. The 2018 and 2019 Boards worked diligently to find ways to cut our spending and for 2019, we should show incomes in both the ADDC convention and the Association's funds! The 2019 transfer of our Association Distribution Office responsibilities to the management company *Charity Rising* cut the cost of our ADO from \$68,000 to around \$32,000. The realignment of regions and eliminating the office of Vice President and position of Executive Assistant significantly reduced the administrative costs of the Association by reducing travel and room costs for board meetings.

In addition to these cuts, this year's Budget and Planning Meeting is being cut from two days to one day, reducing the cost of the hotel by one night. This will be a challenge, but your 2020 Board is committed to limiting the meeting to business that can't be handled by electronic means or during our monthly Board conference calls. But there's more...beginning in 2021, the ADDC Board Meeting at Convention will be moved from Tuesday to Thursday, reducing the Board's hotel costs by two nights. This change can't be implemented until next year because of the impact to the convention hotel room nights contract obligations that are negotiated up to two years before the convention date. The contracted room nights for the 2021 Convention in New Orleans have been negotiated with fewer nights on Monday and Tuesday since the Board won't be required to arrive until Wednesday. We truly feel we have accomplished a lot of what the membership has wanted to see over the past couple of years and that with everyone's help, we can continue to see our Association rise!

Please be aware of quickly approaching deadlines for membership renewals and dues, proposed changes to ADDC Bylaws and Standing Rules, and 2021 Regional Director Nominations. Until next month....

Gregory B. Upton, Jr.

Presenting: Our Gulf Coast Energy Outlook

Greg Upton is Assistant Research Professor at the Louisiana State University Center for Energy Studies. His research interests are related to the analysis of economic, environmental and public policy issues in the energy industry.

During his tenure at LSU, Dr. Upton has addressed a number of topical energy issues of significance to Louisiana, including the impact of the oil price collapse on Louisiana's budgetary challenges, solar tax credits and net metering policies, and implications of the crude oil export ban's lifting on the Louisiana economy, among others. He is author of the chapter entitled "Mineral Revenues in Louisiana" in the book "Exploring Long-Term Solutions for Louisiana's Tax System." He has presented research on these topics to more than 80 industry, governmental and academic audiences, and has been cited more than fifty times in local and national media. He has written guest columns about energy related issues affecting Louisiana appearing in the *Baton Rouge*, *New Orleans and Acadiana Advocate*, *Baton Rouge Business Report*, *New Orleans' Times-Picayune*, *Lafayette's Daily Advertiser*, and *Public Utilities Fortnightly Magazine*.

Dr. Upton holds a Ph.D. in Economics from Louisiana State University where he also received both an M.A. in economics and a B.S. in economics with a concentration in empirical analysis. He is a member of professional organizations such as the American Economic Association (AEA), International Association of Energy Economics (IAEE), and the Southern Economic Association (SEA). He has taught courses the Department of Environmental Sciences and Department of Economics at LSU and is a program faculty member at Michigan State University's Institute of Public Utilities.

Is the US Shale Boom Really Slowing Down?

Since taking flight in 2008, the American shale oil revolution has probably been the biggest energy story since the end of World War II. U.S. crude oil production has leaped 160 percent to almost 13 million b/d. Shale has transformed global energy markets and obliterated the long-held notion that U.S. crude production peaked in 1970 at 9.7 million b/d.

In fact, thanks to shale, the U.S. has accounted for almost all new global oil production over the past five years. For 2019 alone, the shale industry added some 1.2 million b/d of crude, enough to even cover new global demand.

The emerging question now is whether or not the U.S. shale oil boom is slowing down. In truth, however, the more poignant question is whether or not the industry is just “growing more slowly.” Indeed, these are fundamentally different questions that too often get conflated. Regardless, already accounting for a rising 80 percent of U.S. crude production, without shale there may be no new U.S. supply.

For sure, rapid shale well decline rates mean more drilling, higher debt, and smaller profits. The question of peaking shale though really lies in West Texas’ Permian basin. The Permian is now one of the largest oilfields in the world and accounts for over 35 percent of U.S. crude production. The Permian though has some 3-4 million b/d of new pipeline capacity coming within the next few years, with numerous additional gas pipelines meaning less flaring and more oil.

Further, if oil prices can stick above \$65 or \$70, U.S. shale would be given the proverbial “shot in the arm” to better its finances. Such low prices in recent years have already forced the industry to slash costs and greatly increase efficiency. Many producers have sharpened their knife so much that they have breakevens in the \$40 range.

Is the US Shale Boom Really Slowing Down?

But the real driving force behind more U.S. oil production is the ongoing importance of oil. Let us be clear: oil supplies some 33 percent of global energy and projections of absolutely declining demand are speculation since oil currently has no material substitute. Although lower in 2019, global oil demand usually rises at 1.3 million b/d.

Any slower growth in oil demand comes more from slower economic conditions than any structural change. Electric cars are overstated since they are not affordable. The average Tesla buyer, for instance, makes a whopping \$400,000 per year. The rise of gas-guzzling SUVs in the still developing nations will likely compensate for oil demand reductions that come from electric cars.

Indeed, an ever-expanding U.S. oil export complex will mandate more domestic production. We already know that the oil is there: in December 2018, the “largest U.S. oil and gas discovery ever” was made in the Permian basin. Nationally, proven reserves have more than doubled over the past decade to 65 billion barrels. The resource available is many times that.

To be sure, however, such high growth rates for U.S. crude production like we have seen in recent years cannot be maintained. With significant CAPEX reductions, some see output rising in 2020 at less than half the rate of 2019. Farther out, IEA still has the U.S. supplying 85 percent of new global crude in the 2020s. A peaking at 16 million b/d for total U.S. crude output seems possible, but do not expect drastic declines in the absolute sense. Oil is just too important, and we simply have too much of it.

Ultimately, beyond shale, the next U.S. oil revolution could be one that not even the industry itself is promoting enough. This would be the widespread deployment of CO₂-EOR technologies. This tertiary oil recovery process centers on capturing anthropogenic CO₂ from industrial facilities and pumping it safely into the ground to lower the viscosity of the crude left after primary and secondary operations. CO₂-EOR is a net carbon reducer and importantly has been supported by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

DETOX CHICKEN SOUP

Cleansing, immune-boosting soup packed with all the good stuff (kale, mushrooms, celery, carrots, etc.) without compromising any taste!

Ingredients

2 tablespoons olive oil, divided

1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch chunks

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

1 onion, diced

2 carrots, peeled and diced

2 celery ribs, diced

4 cloves garlic, minced

16 ounces cremini mushrooms, thinly sliced

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme

1/2 teaspoon dried oregano

8 cups chicken stock

2 bay leaves

1/2 cup uncooked orzo pasta

1 sprig rosemary

1 bunch kale, stems removed and leaves chopped

1 (15-ounce) can cannellini beans, drained and rinsed

Juice of 1 lemon

2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley leaves

DETOX CHICKEN SOUP



Directions:

Heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a large stockpot or Dutch oven over medium heat. Season chicken with salt and pepper, to taste. Add chicken to the stockpot and cook until golden, about 2-3 minutes; set aside.

Add remaining 1 tablespoon oil to the stockpot. Add onion, carrots and celery. Cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, about 3-4 minutes.

Add garlic and mushrooms, and cook, stirring occasionally, until tender and browned, about 5-6 minutes. Stir in thyme and oregano until fragrant, about 1 minute.

Whisk in chicken stock and bay leaves; bring to a boil. Stir in orzo, rosemary and chicken; reduce heat and simmer until orzo is tender, about 10-12 minutes.

Stir in kale and cannellini beans until the kale has wilted, about 3-4 minutes. Stir in lemon juice and parsley; season with salt and pepper, to taste.

Serve immediately.
